### **How did you start collecting plates? Was there someone who was your mentor?**

My late father was an avid license plate collector. His collection is displayed in my Mom's garage in Colorado. Since Colorado changed their plates every year, he would just remove the current plate and tack it into the garage. Most of his plates go back to at least the 1950's. When Colorado removed the month and year from the plates (back in 1977) they began the staggering tab system, thus keeping the same plate. I started collecting plates within the past six months to keep my late father's legacy alive.

### **What plates do you collect and which are your favorites? Where do you get most of your plates?**

I currently have about 40 plates although some are duplicated. Nebraska, Washington, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona (maroon), Missouri, Idaho, Texas – just to name a few..

### **What other non-license plate hobbies do you have?**

I like to work on puzzles. Which by the way – I just recently completed a license plate puzzle of 1000 pieces. It is shaped exactly like the United States. That took nearly three months to complete (but only working on it part-time). It was truly a challenge for me, as there were many different color blends. So I am proud of myself for taking on such a unique challenge. And what makes this puzzle different from all the rest is that some of the plates are old, some are new, and just splattered every which way – all overlapping each other.
